Peter Kiers became weather guru by virtue of his access to the Windfinder app which gave detailed forecasts of wind, tides and wave heights throughout the day. The forecast was F4-5 North Westerly which seemed fine for the 10 mile trip south to the Glenans. Peter did mention that we should aim to leave by midday, then something about waves, but I was sure it would be a morceau de gateaux, as they probably say in France after a few red wines.

Midday next day came and went. People were still ambling about, finishing shopping, chatting etc, so we didn't leave harbour till around 1400, or midday Drascombe time. Conditions were cloudy, but otherwise as forecast. Two of the other Coasters, *Windroos*, sailed by Fred and Ils Roos, and *Vet Free*, sailed by retired vet Bert Zwaag, joined in starting on jib and mizzen, while *Spray*, *Batyr* (sailed by Peter, and Phillip Scheers) and *Dulcibella*, had their mains up, probably reefed. Good progress was made for about three hours with all boats remaining in sight, but the
